National Service Officers – the top NSO recruiter of Auxiliary senior members (minimum of 50 new paid senior members) will receive \$250!

Life Membership

A down payment of \$20 will start a new life membership.

Also, any senior member who has paid their annual dues through June 30, 2015, can convert to a life membership now with no down payment!

Life Membership Amounts are based on the member's age at time of application.

Age	Amount
80 and over	free
71 through 79	\$140
61 through 70	\$180
46 through 60	\$200
31 through 45	\$230
18 through 30	\$250

Always provide a date of birth to guarantee assignment in the correct life membership cost category.

When recruiting new members....

- ★ Always inform new members that the membership year begins July 1 and ends the following June 30.
- ★ Advise new part-life members they will receive quarterly payment reminders.
- ★ Urge new members to begin their Auxiliary membership with a \$20 down payment toward a life membership. They have the privilege of making annual payments if they so choose.
- ★ Remember that our eligibility requirements have significantly expanded to include extended family members of disabled veterans and not-dishonorably discharged veterans. Check the constitution and bylaws or web site for further clarification.

Remember: It makes "cents" to recruit!!!



Americanism by Ellen Timmerman, National Americanism Chairman

Many countries have specified when they can fly their national flag. The U.S. is different; government installations fly the flag every day and the public can fly it whenever they choose.

For a stationary flag displayed on a building, pole or staff, it is customary to fly it from sunrise to sunset. You are only permitted to display your flag at night if it is properly illuminated. This means that you must have a light dedicated to "spotlighting" your flag. With the right lighting, you can fly your flag 24 hours a day for as many days as you like.



According to the Flag Code, the American Flag should be flown:

⇒ On or near every polling place on election days. *Voting is one of the most important rights we have as Americans. It, like the flag, represents our freedom, and stands as a basis for our governmental structure. It is a requirement that the flag is flown on election days at polling places.*

⇒ On or near the main administration building of all public institutions.

⇒ On or near every schoolhouse (during school days). *The flag is to be flown at public schools and colleges to instill a sense of patriotism in the students. These institutions are owned by the government and important to the nation. Although it is strongly suggested to fly the flag in these areas, it is not required.*

There are many dates on the internet for "Flying the US Flag;" far more than what is listed below!

1—New Year's Day
20—Inauguration Day
(every four years)
3rd Monday—Martin Luther King Jr. Birthday

February:

12—Lincoln's Birthday
22—Washington's Birthday

May:

2nd Sunday—Mother's Day
3rd Saturday—Armed Forces Day
Last Monday—Memorial Day

June:

14—Flag Day
3rd Sunday—Father's Day

July:

4—Independence Day

September:

1st Monday—Labor Day
11—Patriot Day
17—Constitution Day

October:

2nd Monday—Columbus Day

November:

11—Veterans Day
4th Thursday—Thanksgiving Day

December:

7—Pearl Harbor Day
25—Christmas Day
